



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In accordance with the directive contained in Section 2151.18 Revised Code of Ohio, submitted herewith is the annual report of the Common Pleas Court, Juvenile Division of Preble County, Ohio for the calendar year 2024.

A Message from Judge Jenifer K. Overmyer

As we reflect on the past year, Preble County Juvenile & Probate Court is proud to present this annual report, highlighting our efforts to serve the youth, families, and vulnerable individuals within our community. This annual report serves as an overview of the Court's activities, achievements, and contributions to the community over the past year.

In 2024, the Court, through a grant provided by the Ohio Attorney General's Office, upgraded the outdated method of capturing fingerprints on paper and moved to a digital LiveScan fingerprinting device. This has greatly increased the speed with which required fingerprints are received by BCI and improves the quality of the prints collected. The Court is in the process of integrating its case management system to allow electronic reporting of critical adjudication information.

The Juvenile Probation Department received new case management software to improve supervision of youth. The Ohio Juvenile Supervision System (OJSS) allows probation staff the ability to streamline check-ins, case tracking, and document management. This year, the probation department also relocated to a new building to enhance community access and received a grant from the Ohio Department of Youth Services to support supervised community service for youth in exchange for restitution to victims.

As we look to the future, we remain committed to continuing to provide exceptional service to everyone who enters our doors. We are honored to present this report representing our hard work and dedication with you.

CASA PROGRAM

CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children) are local volunteers serving as the voice of children who are in the Juvenile Court system because of abuse, neglect, or dependency. These advocates investigate by visiting with the child and interviewing foster parents, parents, and other adults involved in the child's life. They monitor the child's and parents' involvement with Children's services, attend Juvenile Court hearings, and recommend placement and services for the child through written reports.

SAFE PROGRAM

The Strength-Based Alternatives in the Family Environment (SAFE) Program is an intensive family-centered intervention service that is delivered in the home and designed to stabilize family functioning. SAFE preserves the safety of the child, family, community and maintains the child in the home. SAFE provides alternative behavior choices to the child and family. Families are not required to participate. It is completely voluntary.

PROBATION SERVICES- DIVERSION

The Court Diversion program is an early intervention and prevention program. Its mission is to give youth who commit status and specific criminal offenses an alternative to becoming involved in the court system and acquiring a criminal record. Youth complete a variety of activities which may include a written essay, behavioral change assignments, community service hours, donating items to local food banks or animal shelters, and writing letters of apology.

Diversion utilizes Court Solutions online courses with nearly all youth. These courses address several issues including alcohol awareness, anger management, life skills, and decision making.

Truancy Data

Pursuant to ORC 2151.18, HB 410 data regarding habitual truancy is required. Specifically, under ORC 2151.28(G), the data shall include:

- 1. The number of children placed in alternatives to adjudication: 9
- 2. The number who successfully completed alternatives to adjudication: 11
- 3. The number who failed to complete alternatives to adjudication and were adjudicated unruly: 0

Note: While the number of program completions in 2024 appears higher than new placements, this reflects the inclusion of youth who were enrolled in the program in late 2023 and completed it in the current year.

PROBATION SERVICES- ADAPT

The ADAPT program (Alcohol and Drug Addiction Prevention and Treatment) is a behavioral change program that utilizes evidence-based programming and connection to appropriate services to guide youth toward a drug-free lifestyle. Youth may be referred to the ADAPT program if they had a drug related offense or presented with a high risk of substance abuse.

While youth are on probation with the ADAPT program, they work through behavioral change guides based on their needs, learn substance abuse awareness and prevention, coping skills, problem solving, decision making, emotional regulation, communication skills, and conflict resolution.

EVIDENCE-BASED PROBATION

Youth who are placed on probation who do not present a need for drug or alcohol services are placed on Evidence-Based Probation. Like the other probation programs, these youth are provided with behavior change programming aimed at reducing their risk of recidivism.

Coaching is used throughout the youth's probation term to empower them to develop leadership skills, self-discipline, self-awareness, personal accountability, and prosocial decision-making.






